CNPS Mission

- To conserve California native plants and their natural habitats, and increase understanding, appreciation, and ***horticultural use*** of native plants

Horticulture & Membership

- Native plant sales consistently deliver new and renewing memberships.
- 80% of CNPS members have an interest in native plant gardening (2006 survey).
- Members expect CNPS to support & sustain their interest in native plant gardening.

Horticulture & Revenues

- **Plant sales** are the top revenue source for many chapters.
- Membership dues collected at **plant sales** go to the general fund which pays for state staff salaries and program **expenses** (not counting contract staff or expenses).

*Today CNPS is dependent on **plant sales** to raise funds for chapters and state.*

Diversifying Sources of Revenue

- Native plants are becoming more popular and more widely available at retail nurseries.
- In some chapters, plant sale revenues are leveling off or declining.
- *There is a strategic need to diversify sources of revenue beyond plant sales!*

Why Chapter Hort Symposia?

- Build on CNPS core competencies:
 - Expertise/knowledge
 - Volunteer Energy
 - ~~Bank Balance~~
- Translate core competencies into \$\$\$.
- Tap into growing interest in sustainable landscaping, water conservation, and lawn replacement.
- Target the general public.

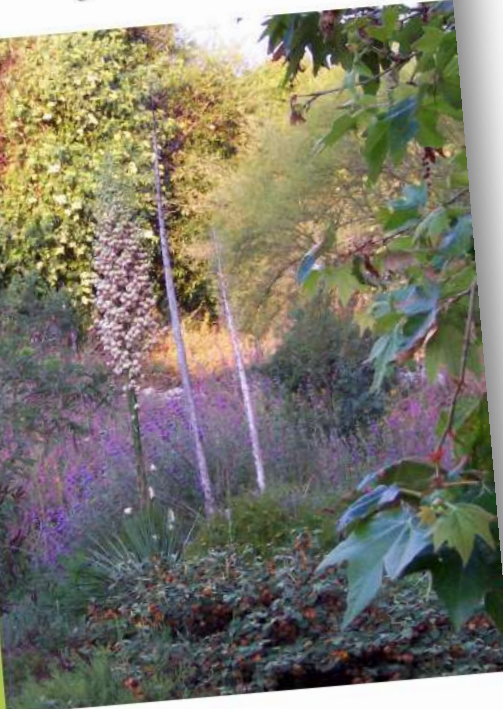

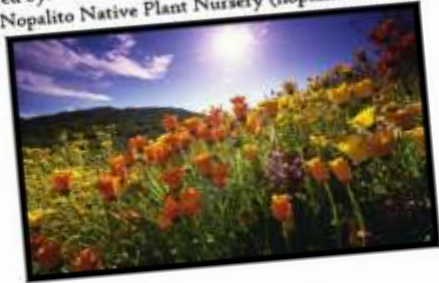

Organizing a Hort Symposium

- What's involved in organizing a symposium?
- What obstacles might you face?
- How can the state office help?
- How can the Hort Committee help?

What the Chapter Does

1. Form a committee & solicit volunteers.
2. Prepare a budget.
3. Confirm a venue/date/time.
4. Confirm theme/topics/speakers.
5. Confirm sponsors.
6. Publicize.
7. Arrange caterer, if needed.
8. Conduct program.
9. Do the accounts.

How the State Office Can Help

1. Provide \$500 seed grant/capital.
2. Provide Certificate of Additional Insured.
3. Publicize through state website & eNews.

How the Hort Committee Can Help

1. Suggest themes, topics, speakers.
2. Contact high profile speakers.
3. Provide template letters for approaching local agencies for sponsorship.
4. Provide template letters for approaching a local educational institution for a venue.
5. Consult by email/phone.
